





# Bringing water and resilience to mountain communities TAJIKISTAN

WASH LEARNING SERIES 2025

### Problem

- Households, schools and mosques have low access to water services
- High financial (or time) burden to either purchase water from tankers or collect it from mountains 7 to 10km away
- High vulnerability to waterborne diseases and climate hazards

### Results

- 3,478 individuals gained access to clean water through 25 distribution points
- School with 520 students connected to water supply
- Water committees established and 44 volunteers trained
- Strong relationship with local water department

#### Lessons

- Plan construction around climate events and agricultural seasons
- Value of strong community engagement from design through implementation and maintenance
- Establish water committees with clear maintenance protocols

#### **Factors for success**

- Strong engagement of local communities, contribution of community labor
- Involvement of the district management and local water department
- Effective advocacy for project goals through religious leaders and local activists
